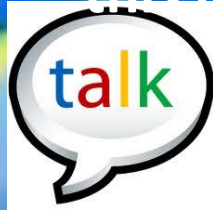

Essential Questions, Objectives and Standards.....

Essential Question: What was Kipling's purpose in writing the Jungle Book stories and how did he use the poems he included?



Objectives:

The student will identify the main purpose of “The Jungle Book” stories. The student will define foreshadowing and identify how it is used in “The Jungle Book” stories.

Standards:



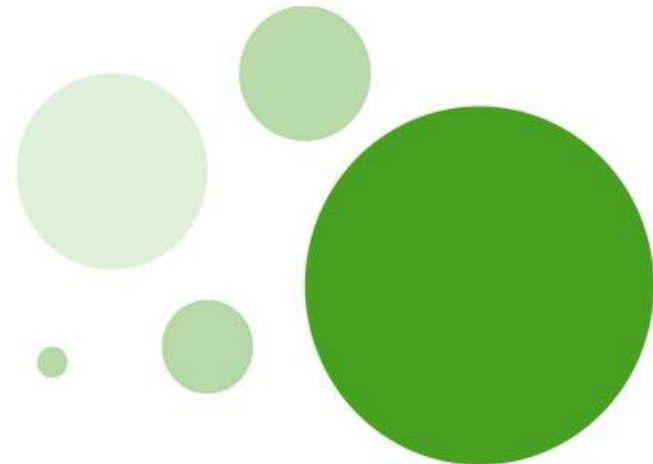

What of the quarry ye went to kill?

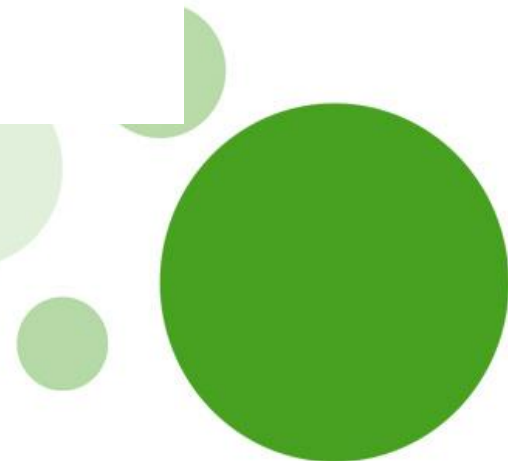
Brother, he crops in the jungle still.

Where is the power that made your pride?

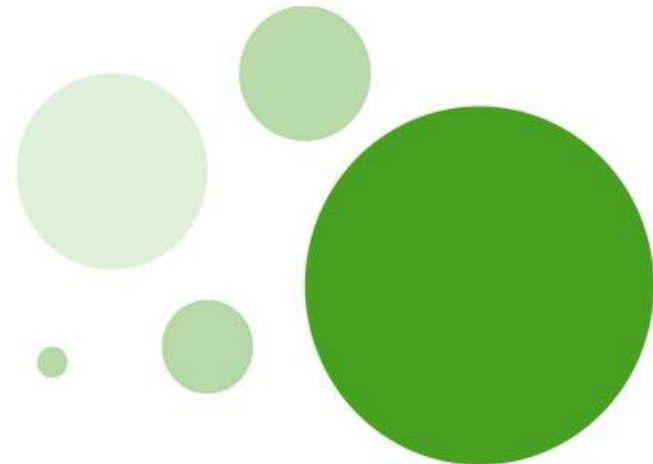
Brother, it ebbs from my flank and side.

Wolf that shall break it must die.*

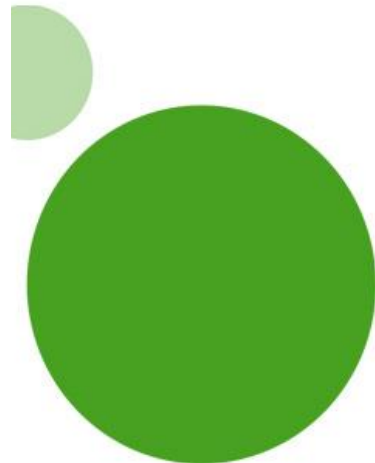
*As the creeper that girdles the tree-trunk, the Law

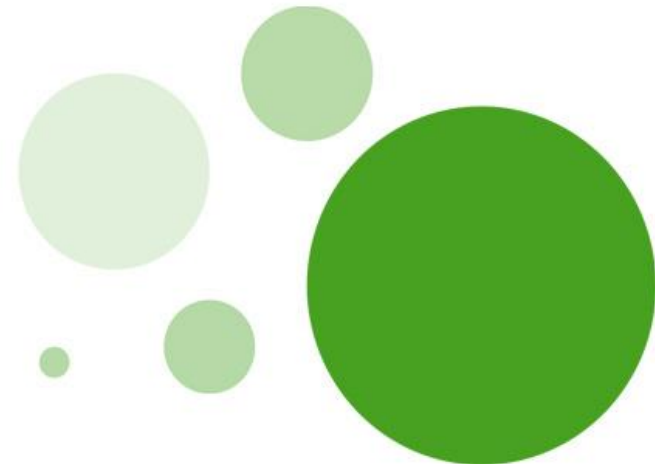
