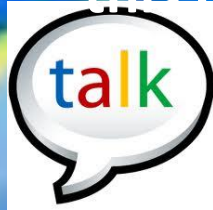

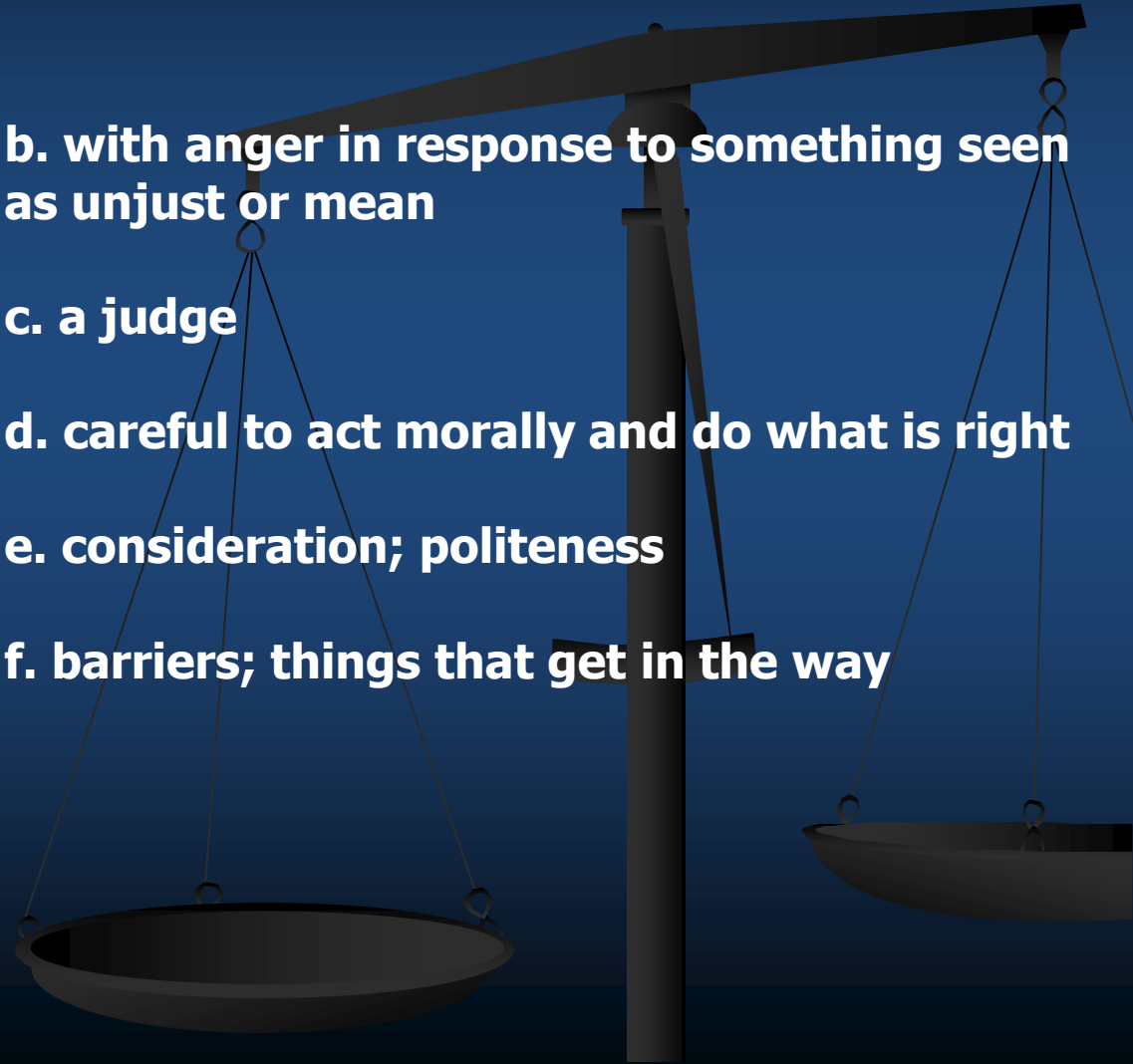

# Deductive Reasoning

- The judge in today's story uses deductive reasoning to find the truth in the three cases she faces when the king is visiting.
- **Deductive reasoning** occurs when a person examines a set of facts and then arrives at a new piece of information which he believes to be true if the original facts are true.



## Reasoning



### Step 1. Observe



Make observations using the five senses.

### Step 2. Hypothesize



Based on initial observations using the five senses, propose an explanation of the situation.

### Step 3. Test



Now check your hypothesis through a number of tests. Make more observations using the senses and record your findings.

### Step 4. Verify



Do the tests support the hypothesis? If so, you have arrived at a conclusion. If not, you may have to begin again with Step 1.



How is Gonta different from other thieves?

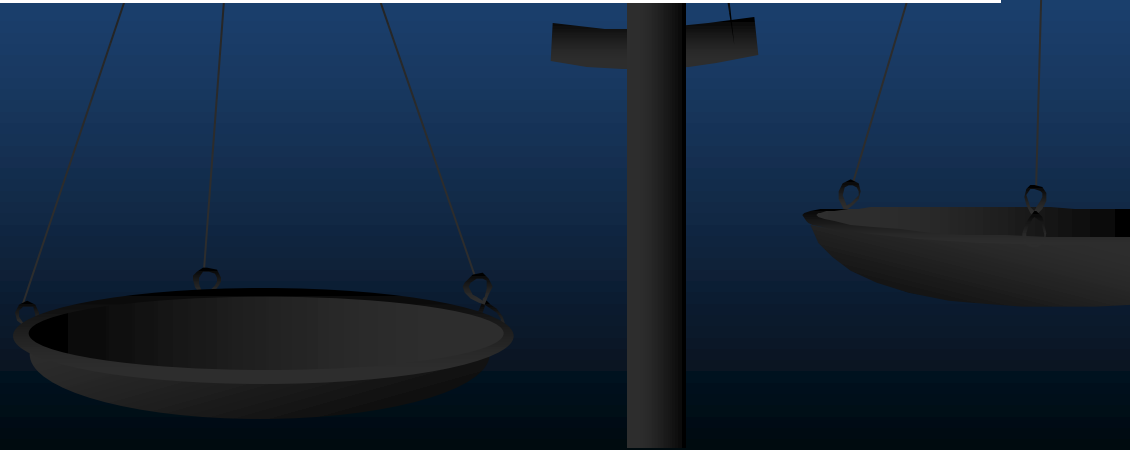


- He steals because he hates the rice storeowner; others steal because they hate the law.

Why won't the guard and the rice storeowner admit they fall asleep? Draw a conclusion.

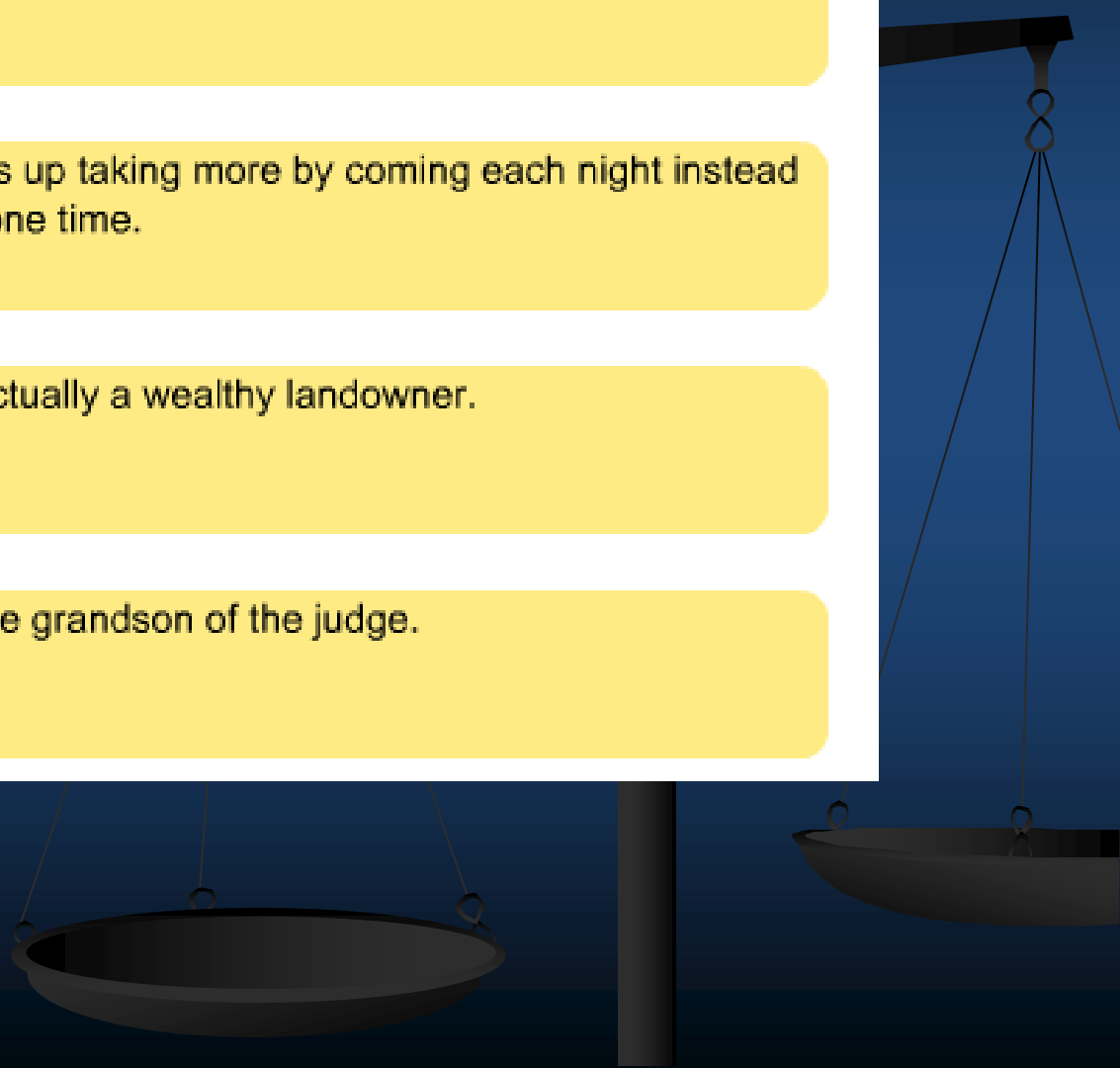
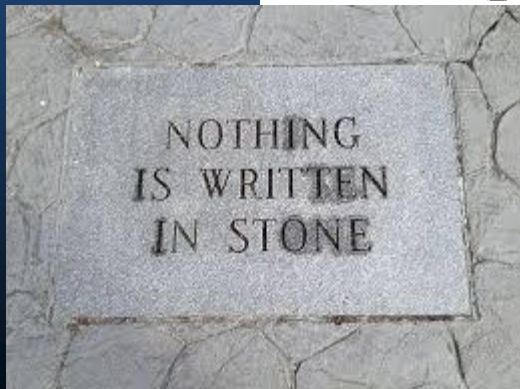
- They are too proud to admit that they cannot stay awake.

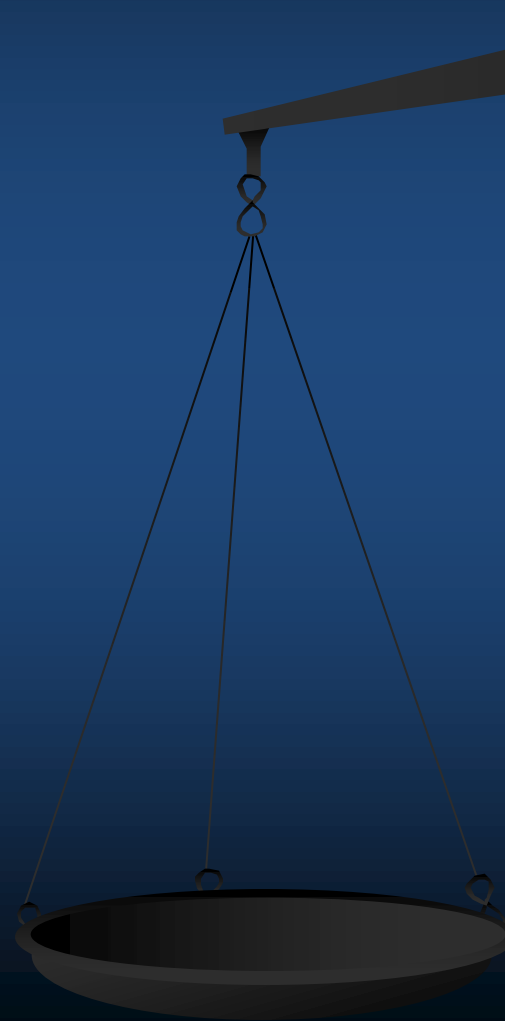

# What does the word 'Irony' mean?



Why is a dentist's eating too much candy an example of irony?

- It is the opposite of what you might expect.
- It is very funny.
- It is exactly what you would assume would occur.
- Dentists never eat candy.



That's an example of **irony**. [Irony](#), or the adjective *ironic*, is a word used to describe a situation in which what is expected to happen and what actually happens are very different. Writers often use irony in their work as a way of surprising and entertaining their readers.



# Irony

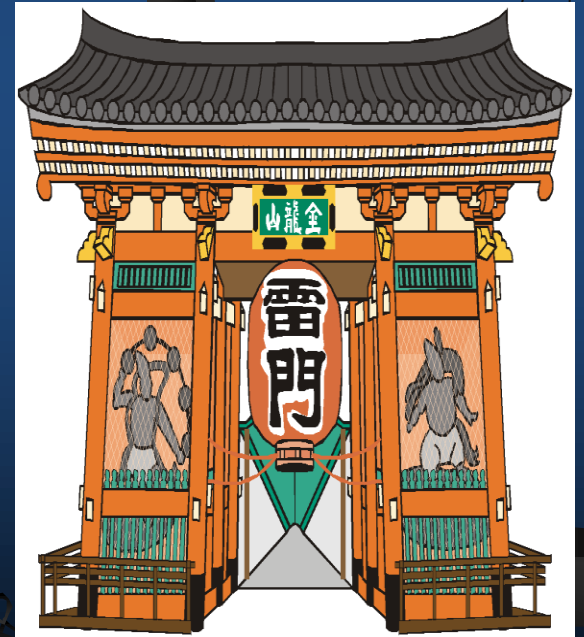
- **Verbal**-When what someone says something different from what they really mean, or something different from what would be the expected statement in that particular situation.
  - For example, if your little brother is sitting on the couch scowling because he has to read a book rather than watching TV. And you say, with a smirk, "I'm glad to see you're so happy about reading."
- **Situational**-When the outcome of a situation is totally unexpected and surprising based on earlier events.
  - For example: if a championship swimmer drowns, or a firehouse burns down.
- **Dramatic**-When the audience or reader knows something that the characters do not, something which adds suspense or humor.
  - For example, if the audience knows that Juliet only drank a sleeping potion and is not dead but Romeo doesn't know.

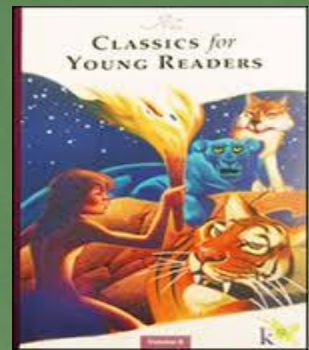
